This science forum is an amazing initiative that never fails to deliver for the lucky few that get to go. We are all looking forward to **Aoibh** coming back to tell us of all her adventures while away at camp. Good to see **Bernard** was able to make it again.

GUEST SPEAKERS: MERLIN AND FRANCIS

Next up were our guest speakers **Dr Francis Nathan** (Ophthalmologist) and spouse **Merlin Nathan** (Occupational Therapist). They are members of the **Australian Friends of Palestine** and volunteer their time a couple of times a year in the **Gaza Strip** and **West Bank** in Palestine and have been doing so for 17 years.

Merlin was first up to talk, she treats children with disabilities, injuries and trauma as an Occupational Therapist. I was amazed to hear the things she has done for these children while over there, a small sample below:

- Worked with kids getting chemotherapy
- Taught rehabilitation skills
- Taught beauty and massage
- Taught relaxation and meditation
- Rebuilt adult wheel chairs and adapted them for kids

She could have gone on for hours, she even helped raise money to convert a concreted area into a sports ground that the local kids could play soccer.

Francis was next; when he heads over to Palestine he is usually part of a surgical team that donate their skills in areas of need. His specialty while over there is cataract surgery, and to date over 17 years, he and other Ophthalmologists have performed 2544 of these operations. He was first invited to go over to Jerusalem in

2000 by a colleague as part of a team sent by SEE – *Surgical Eye Expeditions,* and has now been there too many times to remember. These teams have also helped find and obtain:

- Sterilising equipment
- Microscopes
- Surgical instruments
- Medications

His quote from Hahatma Ghnadi to finish was quite appropriate – "An eye for an eye only ends up making the whole world blind" –. Two incredible people doing amazing work for those less fortunate.
