Today Andrea not only works full time but **runs a school teaching Portuguese** to students, even at SASE level. The school **started with 10 students and today has 45**, all run out of Burnside Primary School. An amazing journey and one that was thoroughly entertaining to listen to, thanks Andrea.

Andrea was a club guest last week and picked **the 3**rd **place getter** in the **Melbourne Cup Sweep**. Andrea was over the moon when club treasurer presented her with \$4.
