
- Gulgong is believed to be one of the primary locations in Thomas Alexander Browne's Robbery under Arms, published under the name of Rolf Boldrewood
- Novelist and bush poet Henry Lawson lived briefly in Gulgong as a child in the early 1870s, while his
 father sought instant wealth as a miner. A montage of goldrush-era Gulgong street scenes was used
 as a backdrop to the portrait of Lawson on the first Australian ten dollar note.
- Jimmy Governor, on whom **Thomas Kenneally** based his character for The Chant of Jimmy Blacksmith, grew up in the Gulgong district.


