MEREDITH BURGESS: MAGILL RSL

'The Price of Liberty is Eternal Vigilance' is the motto of the Returned Services League (RSL), which was adopted by the League in 1923 after its foundation in 1916. The League's founding was in response to a lack of oganised repatriation and medical facilities that were available to those returning from the Great War. This was in addition to helping the families of those who did not return.

The core business of the RSL revolves around the five pillars of **Advocacy, Services, Mateship, Commemoration** and **Sustainability**.

The Magill Sub-Branch can be traced back to 1921, but actually came into being in April 1946 (75th anniversary this year). Land in Lorne Avenue was offered to the sub-branch by the City of Campbelltown in 1947 and the current building was completed in 1958.

Membership is not a requirement for any person to visit the club and the clubrooms can be hired or donated to groups for functions. There's and open invitation to veterans and their families the first Tuesday of every month for a free fish and chip lunch. See below.

There are regular tour guides for schools, scouts with the **extensive military memorabilia being the feature.**

Meredith told us of the history of how The Gums became a centre for celebrating Anzac Day, the Memorial Walk and now **relocating the WWI memorial near Magill Primary to the Gums**.

Meredith went on to give us facts and figures on the number of veterans and much more. Thanks Meredith, for bringing us up to speed on your Sub-Branch and the RSL.


