DISTRICT GOVERNOR JEFF NEALE

We were so delighted to have **DG Jeff, Jenny and AG Brian** with us this morning, so we started off the meeting by congratulating Jeff on his appointment to District Governor. **Jeff and Jenny** were able to join us for our changeover in late June, but he had not yet been inaugurated, so this was the first time we've been able to offer him that honour.

Jeff and Jenny have already visited many clubs. He started off by reassuring us that a smaller club often has many advantages not found in larger clubs, such as the ability to quickly make decisions and move on, plus that everyone in the club is fully aware of what the club is doing and gets involved. Yep, that's us!

He played a **video** from International **President Shekhar Mehta** reminding us of the Rotary goals for this year. His main goal is to increase membership to 1.3M, which is about a 10% increase. His motto is **"Grow More, Do More"** and he sees this as a cycle – the more members we have, the more we can do, the more we are noticed, and the more members we attract. Simple logic.

Jeff reminded us that being a Rotarian changes people for the better, so getting more people involved is a great aim in itself. He told us about the idea of Satellite Clubs where, for example, we could have a Magill Sunrise evening satellite club that may attract people who cannot attend for breakfast, but want to be part of the Rotary movement. It's certainly an idea worthy of consideration.

He talked further about **membership & public image** being very important, plus the idea of **vocational service** that is not often seen in Rotary any more. When Paul Harris founded Rotary it was **actually a business networking organisation** and only later became a service organisation, but those roots should not be forgotten or dismissed and have potential.

He also reminded us that we should all know our "**Rotary Story**" (Elevator Spiel). In other words, if someone notices you are in Rotary and **asks you "why?" you should know the answer to that question**. Many Rotarians have been recruited through friends and acquaintances who have been given compelling answers to that question. Think about it. There were several other ideas mentioned that we can't capture in this small space,

Jeff concluded by reminding us of the **District Conference** to be held at the **Barossa Valley in April 2022**. He also told us about compiling a **2021/22 District 9510 Year** Book where each club will have one A4 page to capture what we did in this year. A brilliant resource to hand to people interested in Rotary and to remember a great year.

GUEST SPEAKER: JENNY NEALE

It was wonderful to learn that Jenny is passionately behind several Rotary projects, but none more so than the "allkids" project in support of children in Cambodia. This is a project started in 2012 by the Rotary Club of St Peters and has delivered significant benefits to these kids. This includes schools, additional learning centres and educational day care.

Since inception they have provided **education to 1500 disadvantaged kids**, currently have **500 kids** getting education who wouldn't have otherwise, **750 kids** at learning centres pursuing courses not offered at schools, such as IT and English, and many improvements to existing schools.

Their immediate aim is to raise enough money to build and run a new school in Prek Trabaek. This will cost **\$21,400 to build and \$54,285 to operate for a year**. The club will certainly be looking to support this very worthwhile project.


RYDA - Road Safety Youth Driver Awareness Program
