Guest Speaker: Greg Champion

Thanks to Lindsay, we were exceptionally lucky to have radio & music legend Greg Champion join us for our meeting — and as we found out he is also something of a comedy legend too! Greg grew up just near Heccies on Barons Street and he noted that in his youth the suburb changed from Hectorville to Tranmere North, to Tranmere, and finally Magill as it is today. He quipped that they were exhausted having to move suburb so many times.

As many of us knew, Greg is well known for his role on the long running ABC radio show "Coodabeen Champions", which has been running 41 years, with his involvement for 39 years. It's a very colourful sport-related show that lampoons many sports clubs and their supporters, particularly the AFL. Greg reeled off several examples from over the years that were very witty and amusing, building upon the stereotypes around each team and their supporters.

He's had two big breaks in his music career that he shared with us. The first was in 1985 when he

penned the song "I Made a Hundred In The Backyard At Mum's" which he said was picked up in particular by the other long running ABC radio program headed by Ian "Macca" McNamara who never stopped playing it.

The other break was in 1995 when Channel 7 chose a little song of his called "That's The Thing About Football" and ran for a few years as the introduction to their AFL broadcasts. There is probably no person in a footy state of Australia that doesn't know that familiar tune, which he's even sung live at the AFL Grand Final. And then, like magic, he was right there singing it to us.

Greg has had a long association with Rotary clubs in Victoria volunteering his services in several ways. Now that he's living back in Adelaide, we'll certainly try to ensure that tradition continues, and Greg will certainly always be welcome at our club.



Cost: \$25.00


