Guest Speaker: Aoibh "(Eve)" Greenshields ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS 2021



Aoibh recently attended the RYLA program sponsored by our club. The 6-day Rotary District 9510 seminar was held at Nunyara Conference Centre, Belair in September, and 35 participants aged 18-24 attended sponsored by 28 clubs.

She started off by telling us about her name, which is of Irish Gaelic origins. She explained how this caused some confusion amongst other attendees as they tried to read her name tag, and she was often called something like "Arb". But Aoibh is no shrinking violet and happily "educated" them.

Attendees were provided sessions on Public Speaking, Social Entrepreneurship, First Impressions, Leadership Theory, Attitude, Resilience, and Advocacy and more. On top of that, Aoibh told us about many of the fun exercises that accompanied these sessions, such as having a beard competition as part of one (which her group won!).

Although RYLA was very recent, Aoibh related stories on the character of the other attendees she met and feels she has made lasting friendships from the course, having now caught up socially with several other attendees. She was the youngest person at RYLA having only just turned 18.

Aoibh described her attendance at RYLA (and previously at NYSF) as life changing. She

sees things in very different ways and feels she has learned invaluable lessons. She also connected with other students studying Engineering at Uni, as she is. She has also become a foundation member of East Torrens Rotaract since attending RYLA.

Aoibh's RYLA mentor, Lucy, was also a former RYLA attendee earlier this year and at only 19 years of age put her hand up for this important duty as she also found it to be a life changing experience. They both commented that RYLA is somewhat ageless" and their relative youth compared to other attendees was not really a factor at all.

In thanking Aoibh I commented just how heartening it is for us to hear the words she was saying. When we support attendees at programs like RYLA, we certainly hope that it is both beneficial and life changing for them, so to have confirmation of that is pure music to our ears.

I'd like to also acknowledge the role Lindsay has played in advocating for support of our youth programs and directly doing the hard yards to connect with schools and finding people like Aoibh to take part, which is much harder than it sounds. You've done another amazing job Lindsay and should be very proud.





From the Editor: ROTARY AT WAR

This week is Remembrance Day, the 11th of November. It is one of the most important days on our commemorative calendar, when we acknowledge those who lost their lives during conflicts, in wars and peacekeeping or humanitarian operations. It is a day we stop, reflect and acknowledge their ultimate sacrifice in the name of freedom.

As it is Remembrance Day, I decided to take a look at Rotary during World War 2. Here are a few snippets you may find interesting.

"In the late 1930's and early 1940's Rotary International was finding its very existence threatened in Europe and on the other side of the world in Asia.

As the war officially erupted, entire countries fell to German and Japanese forces. It was recorded in the book "*A Century of Service-The Story of Rotary International - the Story of Rotary International"* that 484 clubs and more than 16,000 Rotarians were wiped off the rolls of Rotary during this time.

In Europe, Rotary records were seized by the Gestapo, Rotarians were

imprisoned, and in Warsaw 12 members of the local Rotary clubs were taken from a meeting and summarily executed. Some Rotary clubs burned every record of membership. After Germany invaded France, French Rotarians continued to meet secretly. From that Book, "*A Century of Service,* "this story was told by the French Rotarians. "One day we were having our club lunch when a German officer, a General Shippert, came into the private dining room where we were sitting. The last mouthful of food stuck in our mouths as we thought he was coming to arrest us. But he was a Rotarian and a past Governor from Germany and said he has come to pay his respects to International President Maurice Duperrey. We were so relieved!"

As was the case in Europe, after the Japanese invaded China and other Pacific Rim countries, Rotary members in the Far East were imprisoned. In areas of the world controlled by Nazi Germany and Imperial Japan, it was difficult to be a member of Rotary; however, Rotarians, where and when they could, stood up to the challenge and Rotary membership made a robust recovery after the end of the war." *From Birmingham Rotary "Grams"*



Rotarians were active providing community service on the home front, especially in Britain, as they tried to restore some sort of normalcy to the lives of those who had lost everything especially during the Blitz. They assisted in the international arena through the distribution of funds, accepting fleeing refugees for the duration and maintaining contact with the Clubs in war torn areas.



"The war-time blitz of Britain proved costly to Rotary as it did to the nation as a whole. London unsurprisingly suffered the most. On one night, for example, the President, Vice-President and Secretary of the Rotary Club of Chelsea lost their lives."

"During and after World War II, Rotarians became increasingly involved in promoting international

understanding. A Rotary conference held in London in 1942 planted the seeds for the development of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), and numerous Rotarians have served as consultants to the United Nations. "

"The last meeting of Rotary Club of Manila, the Philippines was held on the island of Corregidor on May 6, 1942, to induct Gen. Douglas MacArthur as an honorary member. Seven Rotarians conferred honorary membership on General Douglas Macarthur, in a dark tunnel amongst wounded soldiers, prior to the fall of Corregidor."

Hostilities formally ended "at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month" of 1918, in accordance with the armistice signed by representatives of Germany and the Entente between 5:12 and 5:20 that morning.


