Nightingale Park Workshop

Following on from Cr John Flynn's presentation last week, just want to spend a short time throwing around some of the ideas we could support.

Item	Type of Work	Cost
Tennis Court	Resurfacing	\$55,555
Coach's Box	New shelter	\$12,000
Coach's Box	Picnic benches	\$4,500
Interpretative Signs	Replace sign decal and paint	\$7,000
Park Furniture	Repainting and cleaning	\$2,500

Toilet Block	General repairs	\$750

Some other ideas to kick start discussion:

- Collaboration with Scouts, Guides, Landcare and/or Magill PS
- Maybe futures build a garage behind Scout Hall and move market there using Scout Hall indoor space for indoor stalls and Tennis Court/car park area for outdoor stalls. The new "village feel" of Magill may create the right atmosphere for that to happen.





Points raised during discussion:

- Market may not be viable at this location as it would probably have less profile. It was noted that the club used to have a shed behind the Scout Hall
- It was suggested that a large Christmas Tree could be erected every year in the park; maybe on the Woodforde/St Bernards corner, possibly including an event of some sort as a kick off (eg. BBQ). Storage of the tree was raised as an issue to deal with
- Regarding the list of proposed Council refurbishments, the interpretive signs seemed like a popular choice with everyone
- Seemed to be generally agreed that more seating/tables in the park would be good
- It was mentioned that the club has reserves that could be drawn upon and seek a matching Rotary grant to achieve more at the park

- Was also noted that an NRM grant of \$4,000 was received back in the day for "weed control" along the creek line and this went towards purchase of equipment to enable that. This was back when the club was larger and more physically able, so it was generally agreed that similar activities would not practical now. However, club could have a role in coordinating this type of activity in conjunction with Scouts/Guides/Landcare/Magill PS
- It was noted that there was supposed to be a brick trail with named bricks on it that was never completed
- Finally noted that as Council will be moving ahead with these changes we will need to make decisions quite quickly on how we want to support them

A great discussion and many great ideas discussed, so thanks team!

It's been another challenging, but great year and congratulations to you all for your role in keeping the club strong and punching well above its weight. 2022 promises to be even better and I very much look forward to continuing my Rotary journey with all of you. 
