Let's hope peace comes sooner rather than later.



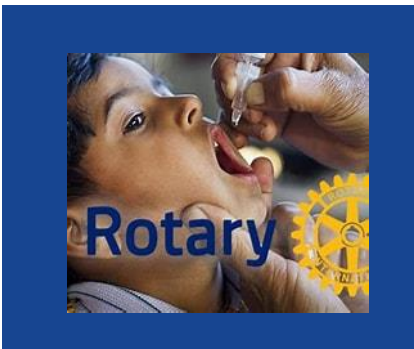

PROCEEDS OF MARCH MARKET TO **POLIO PLUS**

Today we are in the grip of a new virus, the Coronavirus, or more specifically Covid-19. The present pandemic has turned our lives upside down, but no doubt many can recall when there was widespread fear across Australia each and every time there was another outbreak of polio.



In 1956 the Australian Government launched a mass immunisation programme for the prevention of poliomyelitis. All school children and pre-school children were immunised as part of the campaign. I remember lining up with my class mates for the "needle" which was then waved over a flame to sterilise it ready for the next. Just imagine that happening today at the Covid clinic.

The mass vaccination programme was successful and the number of polio victims reduced dramatically over the next few years, which must have come as a great relief to parents across the country.

Still Polio still raged across the globe and in 1988, the Forty-first World Health Assembly adopted a resolution for the worldwide eradication of polio. It marked the launch of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), spearheaded by national governments, WHO, Rotary International, the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), UNICEF, and later joined by additional key partners including the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance. This followed the certification of the eradication of smallpox in 1980, progress during the 1980s towards elimination of the poliovirus in the Americas, and Rotary International's commitment to raise funds to protect all children from the disease.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralysing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort. Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyse as many as 200,000 children each year.

Currently, most of the world is free of polio, and its eradication is within reach. Five out of six World Health Organization regions are now certified wild poliovirus free - the African Region, the Americas, Europe, South East Asia and the Western Pacific. **WE ARE SO CLOSE TO SAYING GOODBYE TO POLIO FOREVER.**

We hope by continuing the market we can change lives and make the world a better place in which to live. How can you help? Come along to our market on the second Sunday of the month at the Campbelltown Memorial Oval between 9am-2pm and buy a snag, a bacon and egg sandwich or a tasty fritter.

ShelterBox

Unfortunately there is no let up from disasters around the world - war, floods, earthquakes, tsunamis, and bushfires. People are left homeless, vulnerable to the elements and traumatised. By supporting ShelterBox we are helping to provide shelter, emergency aid and essentials that people need to begin rebuilding their lives in the aftermath of a disaster.

The sturdy green ShelterBoxes contain family-sized tents specially designed to withstand the elements and provide people with temporary shelter until they are able to start the process of rebuilding a home.

The ShelterKits contain all of the essential tools people need to start repairing and rebuilding homes straight away. The kits and boxes contain the items that help transform shelter into a home, like cooking sets, solar lights and activity sets for children, plus blankets for warmth where required,

Deafblind SA

In Australia it is estimated there are 100,000 people who are deafblind. These people live in a world of varying degrees of silence, darkness and isolation. Our support to DBSA enables the charity to give these people much needed support by organising workshops, camps, social activities, strategies to cope with daily life and with communication such as Auslan and Tactile Auslan. The aim is to empower and give them the confidence to find their place in the community.

Operation Flinders

Operation Flinders provides young people with challenging backgrounds a psychological circuit breaker intended to increase resilience in order to tackle the challenges of life. The program is especially designed for those from environments with family dysfunction, drug abuse, and physical abuse to improve self-confidence and self-esteem, ability to work in teams, and ability to accept responsibility. We have committed ourselves to sending two kids on this program in the hope of making a difference to their lives.

Allkids

Our October market supported AllKids, which provides education to disadvantaged children in rural Cambodia. The program is focused on the coastal commune of Ream in Sihanouk Province, which aims for as many children as possible achieve high school grade 12.
