There was also a series of 'Soapbox' sessions which provided an insight to the great work that many Rotary Clubs are undertaking.

So much of the event tied in with the RI theme of 'serve to change lives'.

I simply left – entertained, amazed and immensely proud to be in Rotary – and a desire to be at any future Rotary Conference I can get to.

I agree wholeheartedly with Thommo's words below. An outstanding showcase of human resilience mixed with lashings of fellowship and fun. District Governor Jeff's interest in raising the profile of the oft-overlooked concept of 'vocational service' was evident throughout the program. Several business owners provided testimony of how their Company ethos revolved around service to others – not just their immediate customers or shareholders. Many speakers described truly moving accounts of how they endured tragic circumstances but emerged stronger and with more focus on leading the best life that they can. At one poignant moment we were all asked to get out our phones and send a message to those close to us, to remind them that we loved them. Suddenly we were getting urgent calls asking if we were in a plane about to crash. The weekend was inspirational and filled with ideas about how we as individuals and as a Club can Serve to Change Lives.



DISTRICT CONFERENCE 9510 – TANUNDA – 1-3APR 2022

Thommo's Impressions of Conference

My overall impression of this year's conference at Tanunda's Faith Lutheran College/Theatre was it was my seventh and one of the best that I have attended. For an amateur group it was of professional standards. The EMCEE, former Campbelltown Rotarian, Lynton Nicholas, was the comedic conduit that seamlessly moved from guest presenter to the next. Lynton has done this before for Rotary and he has improved with age. One theme of the conference was Resilience and the presenter that stood out for me was David Paterson, Chief Executive Officer of the YMCA, an organisation that David briefly touched on. His address "How small Communities can make a Big Difference" melded into David's personal resilience, which began leaving school in after year 11 to heading a global marketing company within 12 years, presenting to customers in the Big Apple. David was persuaded to swap from Corporate to Not for Profit, heading up World Vision, raising \$4 billion in 4 years. His ideas which were just kernels ended up being put to the UN because of persistence and enthusiasm. He resorted to his rural begging at Bute, 'Harvest the Seeds that you Sow'. There was much more to his address, but David impressed me with his ability to drag himself up by his bootstraps to become a world leader. In addition to the top guest speakers, 6 clubs presented on their projects, and all of them worthwhile. The Gala Dinner (masked theme) was a stand out too, beginning with Campbelltown member Aaron Stobie singing his own words, re the conference to the tune of New York, New York. What a fantastic voice. The food was good throughout the conference and especially at the dinner (I put on a kilo).

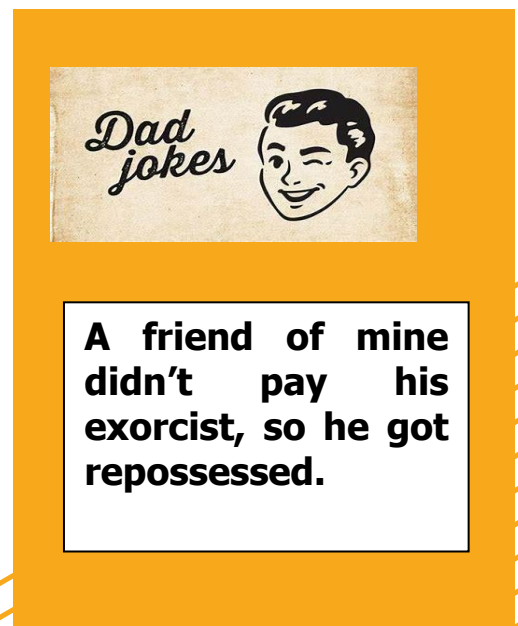
