#### **GUEST SPEAKER: MAYOR JILL WHITTAKER – CAMPBELLTOWN COUNCIL**

It was with great pleasure we welcomed back Mayor Jill to talk to us this morning. In introducing her I was able to reflect on the amazing support we receive from Campbelltown City Council, for which we are all very grateful.

Mayor Jill provided us a presentation updating several areas that have influenced this term of Council and its activities. They revolved around headings such as Financial, Covid 19, Local Business, Environment, Development & Planning & Open Space. All these things dovetail with the new vision of "A Safe, Sustainable, Vibrant Community".

She started by reflecting on the long legacy of her predecessors who have left Campbelltown in an envious position. She was particularly gracious to the work of former Mayor Geoff Heath who passed away fairly recently, but left a significant legacy in the area.

Some of the saddest impacts of Covid 19 were shown in pictures where Citizenship ceremonies could be conducted with small numbers only and no audience. That is unfortunate for such an important day in the life of new migrants who have decided to make this their home. On that front she remarked that most new migrants now are from China and the Indian sub-continent.

She advised us of the Propel SA group, which is the new name of the Eastside Business Enterprise Centre. It's now a collaboration between Campbelltown, Burnside and Walkerville Councils and holds regular events – even breakfasts – with presentations and guest speakers. However, much of the value was through the networking opportunities. Speaking of opportunities, I think the light went on for many of us that we could host this group for a breakfast one morning. Watch this space!

Other things Mayor Jill touched on included issues around Development & Planning, Heritage protection and Open Space conflicting demands. An area she suggested we may be able to collaborate with Council is public art in the Magill Village precinct.

It was a great update and much appreciated by everyone. To cap the morning off, it was my privilege to invoke Mayor Jill as an Honorary Member of our club. Personally, she has had a distinguished career bother locally and in the wider local government circle that epitomises the values of Rotary. As part of the Council, this membership also recognises the strong bonds between our club and Council,


This question was held over from last week. If you could keep only one appliance in your house, which one would you choose?
