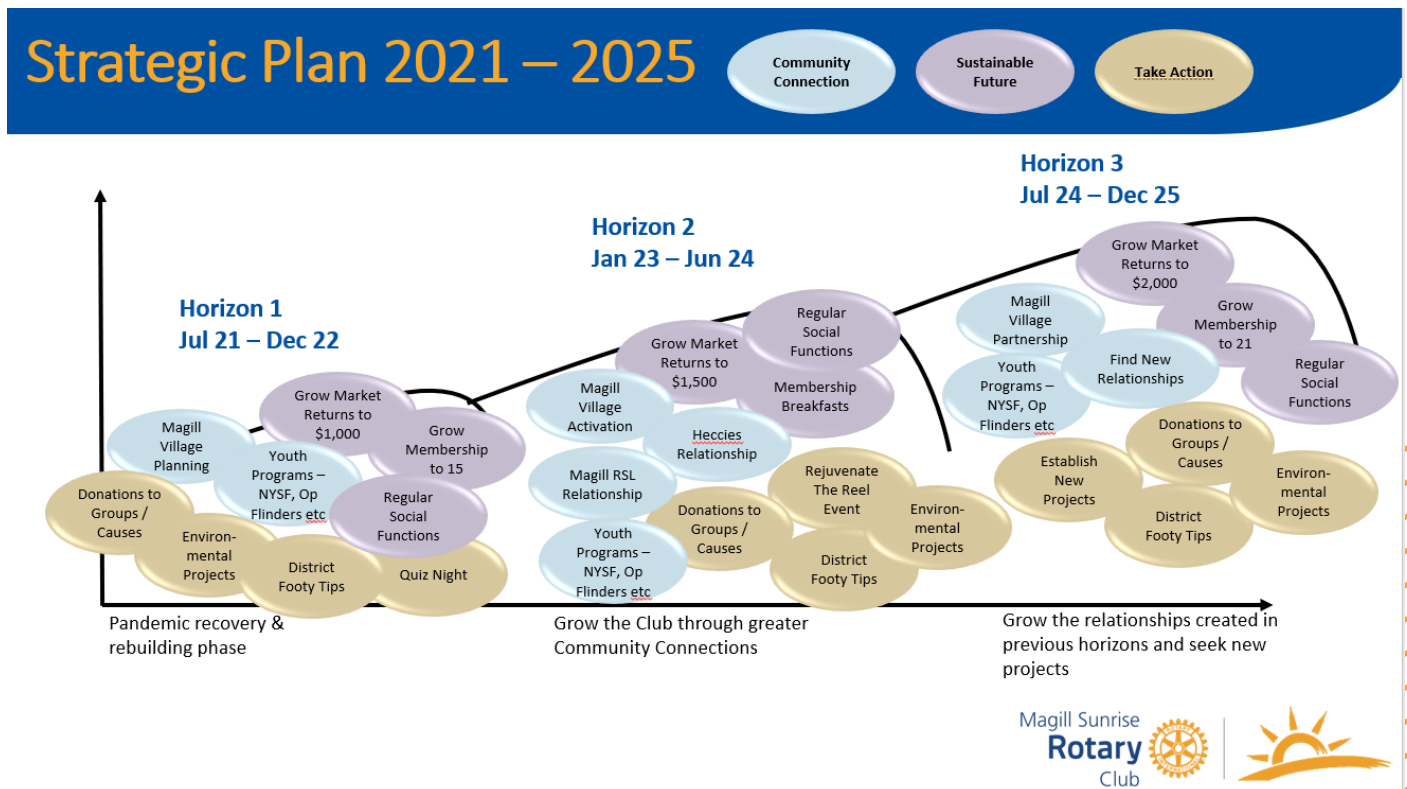
CLUB ASSEMBLY

Sorry that this subject was late notice, but really appreciated the great discussions we had about our draft strategic plan. I hope that you found it was easier to talk strategy when you had some ideas in front of you rather than a blank sheet. I don't know how many times I've done this type of exercise in my working life with many approaches, but I've found this approach is always more productive.

So, those of you who were at the meeting were given a sheet with the following diagram. For those not there, I will be sending an email out to all members and you will be invited to give your feedback too.

Our plan is based around 3 strategic pillars in the circles at the top – Community Connection, Sustainable Future, Take Action. Each one of those colour coded pillars breaks down to a number of strategies to be followed over the next 5 years or so in what we call "horizons" – you can't do everything at once, so you build up from one horizon to the next with your actions.

We had some great discussions around Horizons 1 & 2. Unfortunately time got away from us for Horizon 3, but that's a bit less important as that's the "blue sky" area – setting the path to get there is the most important step! Some comments from the meeting discussions are recorded below.





Discussion Items & Ideas – Horizon 1

- Consider holding a regular evening meeting on the 4th Tuesday. This may allow for members who can't come to breakfast
- Nightingale Park and Calperum were noted as our current Environmental projects, but we could look into more initiatives
- We should consider doing a Risk Analysis of projects like the Market exploring what might impact its prosperity and future viability
- Consider business dinners or drinks events with speakers to engage with businesses and potential members

Discussion Items & Ideas – Horizon 2

- For regular social functions, the idea of an annual "weekend away" was raised, which could be an important way of keeping partners more in the loop too
- For growth of the Market, growing the number of Patrons was thought to be a major issue (this is a bit "chicken and egg" to some extent)
- A new project initiative of a "long lunch" was suggested, which is done by some regional clubs with great success
- The future of The Reel Event was questioned, with an interesting diversity of opinions about whether we can still run it viably or we should drop it. I feel we need a specific club assembly to discuss that item

I concluded by saying everyone will have compulsory homework as I will email this out and expect everyone to provide more feedback.

Having a solid plan in place that is easy to understand is critical for all of us to understand what we are doing, but is also critical in attracting new members. It's something we need to get done!

Thanks everyone for your participation and I look forward to your help in getting this completed very soon.

Rotary District 9510 - South Australia

On the **1st July 2020** Rotary International Districts 9500 and 9520 merged to become one new **District 9510**.

District 9510 embraces most of South Australia, portions of New South Wales, the Victorian Sunraysia area including Robinvale-Euston and half of the Northern Territory. It covers 1,800,000 square kilometres and stretches from the Southern Ocean, Kangaroo Island and Adelaide in the south to beyond Alice Springs in the north, extending to the Western Australia/South Australia border in the west.

District 9510 areas have a population of approximately 1.7 million. Currently, there are approximately 2250 Rotarians in 93 Clubs.

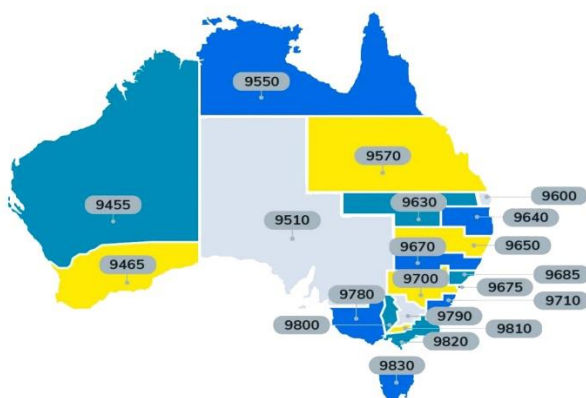
Most of the population live in a narrow coastal belt including near the Capital city, Adelaide (population 1.3 million). The economy of South Australia is centred on industry, commerce, sheep, wheat, cattle, wine, fruit, fishing and tourism.

The southern half of the Northern Territory relies on tourism and cattle. Victoria and New South Wales have varied industries including agriculture, horticulture, mining and tourism.

The District is predominantly semi-arid or arid with spectacular scenery – Ayers Rock (Uluru), wild flowers in profusion after rains, an abundance of native animals and birds, and extensive saltbush grazing lands. The population is sparse and tourism is important to the District's economy.

District 9510 is the home of the longest straight section of rail line in the world (478 km) and contains the largest lead smelter in the world.

The opal fields of Coober Pedy produce some of the world's best opals. The great white shark roams South Australia's waters and the tuna and lobster industries are an important export commodity.

Some who had rich ancestors wanted to go back and find out what they did with the money, as it didn't get passed down.

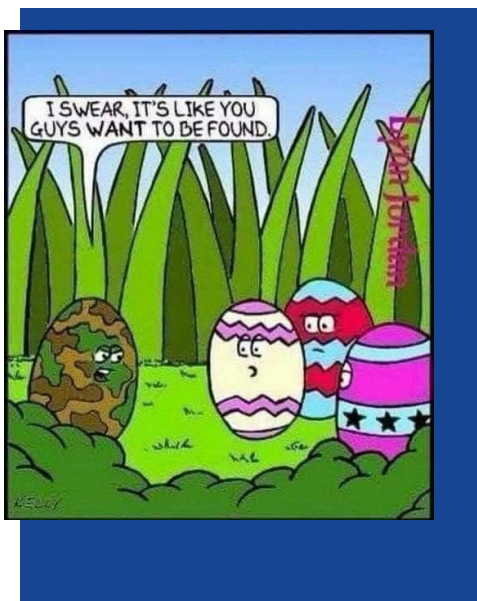
Mark wanted to meet his neanderthal ancestors to ask how they fought off woolley mammoths and sabre toothed tigers.
