It was a superb experience to welcome the students we supported on the Science Experience to find out how it all went. And just wow! It was extremely clear that this experience opened eyes and minds and was potentially life changing for all involved.

Out students were from Years 10 & 11 and all were considering various STEM-related courses, so going to see how that works at University was very valuable. In a social sense we heard how some had connected with others on the program who had come from regional areas like Mount Gambier, so they got a sense of the challenges involved in attending University from that origin.

There were also some very practical aspects about the different campuses that took some getting used to, such as the distances involved in getting to some campuses and the scale of them.

Although they all had an interest in STEM-related courses, they found out that there was quite a bit more to it than they thought, and they will have to keep an open mind to the courses they do. As an example, one remarked that they had not really considered Biology as a Year 11/12 subject because they didn't see how it related to their Uni pathway, but after visiting, they now understand better and will probably do that learning. Others remarked how they had never considered mixed degrees, such as Politics + Science, but they could now see the benefits in considering those approaches.

A great aspect they also talked about was the group discussions they had and the chances to hear lecturers and how they work at Uni. They had pop quizzes at the end of each day to elicit more thought about what they had seen.

Overall, the great thing I picked up was that this had made these extremely intelligent and capable young women excited for their futures and keen to study hard to get the grades they need to move forward. It's wonderful to see the leaders of the future shaping up at this young age ready to face to world and make a difference.

Their teacher and person who has been a wonderful support of this program, Ms Josie Spizzo, must be highly commended for her role in facilitating this program. Mary McKillop College must also be highly commended for supporting the opportunity for this life changing experience.

From our perspective this could not have been more in line with the Rotary International theme for this year Serve to Change Lives. By making this happen for these students it's very clear we're fulfilling that brief!





NEWS FROM OUR GALLOPING GLOBE TROTTERS

Hi Everyone

Here is Part 3 of our travelogue which we hope that you are enjoying. This time, rather than be a destination by destination monologue, we will give you our impressions as Australians abroad:-

Likes

- Scotland, in particular Inverness. The scenery is amazing, in particular going into the highlands up north
- The Orkney Islands
- Loch Ness (didn't see Nessie though, rather disappointing)
- The Castles. We actually stayed in two at Glengarry & Barcaldine. Glengarry, being the much more glamorous
- Prices aren't pumped up at tourist venues as in Australia
- Inverness & Edinburgh in Scotland
- The Lakes District. We stayed in Windermere. Absolutely beautiful.
- In general, the Scots, not Glasgow though
- Did I mention the scenery......All of Scotland......The Lakes District....Liverpool
- Until today, the weather has been perfect. Some rain at night, but the days have been fine, sometimes, even sunny. We have been wearing short sleeves quite often
- We thought that Liverpool would be dirty & grotty, far from it. We could move there tomorrow. The arts scene, the music in the pubs, the architecture, the port etc
- The Beatles and the way that they are revered here. We did the Beatles tour today, privately and it was magnificent.

Dislikes

- The cost of everything, however we had the equivalent of a 5 star meal at the Glengarry Castle and that was GBP 120 = \$220, whereas the same meal in the same surroundings would be \$350+ in Aust. Food costs are in an inverse proportion to Australia. Pub & cheaper meals are horrendous (AUD 150 for a 2 course meal with a bottle of wine) and a "cheap lunch" is 20 quid or \$35 for 2 x sandwiches and a soft drink.
- Tourist entry is also huge at anything and what you get is fairly basic.
- Glasgow. Grotty & sad. Full of drunks. We were unfortunately staying in the "party" end of town and being the pointy end of the football season, the soccer crowds are out in force.
- No Fridges in hotel rooms
- Dogs everywhere, in restaurants, on trains, at tourist venues and the way that they are pandered to....selfies with the pooch anyone?
- General British rudeness
- German prestige vehicle bullies on motorways





Observations

- If travelling make sure you spend the money on apartments
- No Coronation St Chicks in Scotland, nor in Liverpool
- Manchester is an absolute dump. Awful place
- We think that we have a drinking culture..... no way; they drink like fish up here. Admittedly in Glasgow there are major rugby or soccer or who knows matches going on and the pubs are rowdy and everyone is pissed. Not a good look. However, in Liverpool everybody drinks as well, but with the live music scene, everybody goes to the pub to listen to the music and have a bevvie whilst listening. Big difference.

I am old enough to remember Melbourne without pokies and during the '70's and early '80's both Melbourne & Adelaide had fantastic live music scenes. Cold Chisel, Angels, Skyhooks, Sherbert, AC/DC and man, many more. Gee, I wish that was back as it makes such a difference. Here in Liverpool people enjoy the vibe of the pub and getting pissed isn't the main aim.

Off to Wales tomorrow, then Ireland. Very homesick.

Quick tip, if you are planning on spending some time in the UK, buy an annual National Trust membership. Much cheaper. Wish we had known that little trick.

Green Corner – World Bee Day – 20th May



World Bee Day has been recognised by the United Nations since 2018 to raise awareness of the key role that bees and other pollinators play in keeping the planet alive and healthy (<u>World Bee Day | United Nations</u>). Bees are under a very real threat due to human activities. The UN web site (above) outlines some actions that we can all do to try to mitigate the threat to bee diversity. Closer to home the SA government provides

advice on how to attract native bees into our garden (<u>6 steps for attracting more native bees to your garden | Green Adelaide</u>). Some of the simple things include leaving bare ground available, avoiding chemical pesticides, and leaving dead wood in the yard.

Can't be bothered mowing your lawn? You're probably doing the bees a favour.

So what does Rotary have to do with bees? Did you know that there is a Rotary organisation, Rotarians For Bees (RFB), dedicated to the survival of bees in order to provide us all with food security (HOME - Rotarians For Bees). Started here in Australia, also in 2018, RFB provides valuable



information on creating your own bee friendly garden (<u>Plant a Bee-Friendly Garden - Rotarians For Bees</u>). RFB also suggests that Rotary Clubs create bee-friendly environments amongst our many and varied Club projects.



Somewhat off topic but still important is the invasion of the European Wasps in our backyards. These critters have been in Australia since 1978 and can make your backyard social event very unpleasant. Most local councils provide services to eradicate them, but you need to be able to identify and locate their nest. If you have an infestation, call your council,

and get these pests out of your backyard.


