The Rotary Club of Magill Sunrise Changeover breakfast was held on Sunday 3rd July at the Café Outside the Square, in Whitmore Square. The café is a 100% not-for-profit community café and functions/meetings space, providing food, support, and training opportunities for marginalised groups, including those experiencing homelessness. All profits generated service their mission.

We extend our thanks to Celia Petersgould and her team for a great venue and delicious breakfast for our "Changeover", as we welcomed in President Lindsay Davis our twenty sixth President.







OUTGOING PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

When I stood before you this time last year, I told you how honoured I was to be taking the lead of this very special club, particularly after such a great year for the Club under Mark. I looked to a future post pandemic and remarked that the size of the club and our ability to move so quickly proved to be our saving grace during that time.

Unfortunately, the pandemic didn't go away as planned and we lost two of our signature fundraising Market events during the past year, plus put a few more items on hold – for now – and a few meetings. However, I'm very pleased to report that in no way dampened our enthusiasm and resolve to move forward and get things done, which is the true character of our club. We live the Rotary "People of Action" motto.

Our Market again has been a staggering success. Apart from being superb community events allowing many locals and others from further afield to explore a range of fantastic art, craft, food, health and more, the 10 Markets we held generated gross revenue in excess of \$17,000. With the recent addition of the donut machine, we'll probably be targeting 17,000 extra kilos next year!

Through the funds raised we were able to support a wide range of causes – homeless people via the Hutt St Centre, tackling the major problem of Modern Slavery via the Rotary Action Group, the AlfKids charity building schools for underprivileged kids in Cambodia, Mental Health Research via Australian Rotary Health, Operation Flinders supporting local youth, particularly from East Adelaide Education Centre, the Norwood Morialta High School Rowing Club, the Tongan Volcano disaster via a donation to ShelterBox, the Rotary End Polio Now campaign, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, National Youth Science Forum & Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment.



Through the Market we have also been able to seed and grow our friends at the Repair Café Campbelltown. This partnership has been extraordinary leading to the largest ever Repair Café at our last Market in June with 67 items in for repair. They are going so well that they have now extended their hours. We have not only been instrumental in assisting Campbelltown Council to create another vital community initiative that is absolutely flourishing, but in a direct way assisted diversion of tons of waste from landfill.

Special mention to Graham & Robyn, plus Greg & Tash for the exceptional leadership to make our markets happen, plus very special thanks to the Campbelltown City Council for their outstanding support. Without them we would not be able to conduct this vital community event and we would not have been there to assist the Repair Café to become one of the most successful in the business.

In other work, we supported the Rotary CATE (Calperum & The Environment) initiative, particularly by our visit to Calperum last year for a little hands on work. Ian & Suzette have been leading the charge in this area and Ian will now be taking on the leadership of CATE for the next year, which is an incredible achievement. Calperum is in a bit of a state of flux at present, but I'm sure Ian's leadership will help find a way through. Ian & Suzette have also been assisting the Campbelltown Community Nursery initiative to get up and running in many practical ways.

The Club Board has also dedicated funds to the rejuvenation of Nightingale Park, which were then used to gain a District Grant for additional funding. Our Board meeting was rescheduled from last week for various reasons, so we haven't been able to meet and determine the final sum we will be contributing to the park, but it will be significant and continue to stamp our mark right in the heart of Magill.

This is the way we can give back to the Council and Campbelltown community and Mayor Jill you will soon hear from us about that.

We have supported the essential work of the Rotary Foundation through the great work of Lindsay via the popular District Footy Tips competition and via direct donations.

I'll hold it there, but through these and more we have absolutely done something in all 7 Rotary Cause areas – Promoting Peace, Fighting Disease, Providing Clean Water/Hygiene/Sanitation, Saving Mothers & Children, Supporting Education, Growing Local Economies and Protecting the Environment. For such a small club we have punched well above our weight in Rotary.

When I stood here last year I said that I would not be doing a lot to change this club, which has a winning formula and is moving forward. We did introduce a Kaurna acknowledgement and I thank you for accepting that essential initiative. I also wanted us to put more Magill into Magill Sunrise. Maybe we haven't been able to quite achieve that as well as I had hoped, but it's not a bad strategy and I'm sure we'll keep working on that.

We welcomed 2 new members and lost 1 as former President Chris moved to an evening club, so we end up ahead. Not quite the 10% envisaged by RI President Shekhar Mehta, but pretty close. Seeing as we couldn't find another 0.2 of a person to join, I'm calling it a win.

We did hold a number of Club Assemblies as promised and discussed items like the Club Strategic Plan (now close to final), the Charities we support, events we can hold & Market reviews.

Mark provided us a great range of excellent speakers in between times, which was superb.



We also held a number of great social events and have more planned. That's because our club is fun. Unfortunately, I started the year with Rotary quotes at the meetings and apologise for being way too boring and serious. I hope the swap to dad jokes made up for it.

That is the year that was. Thank you Rotarians and friends for your amazing support and encouragement.

With Lindsay coming on we have now moved from a run of repeat Presidents to a run of never-before Presidents of the Club, which is an excellent sign for the future – and I reckon we can probably get another for our President elect in 23/24 too. Watch this space.

Also, thanks Nina and my family for their support. Nina will happily tell anyone who listens about the windows with wood rot that should have been fixed... except that I was at the market or some other thing involving Rotary. She does understand and provides me invaluable support. Thank you.

Rotarians and friends, we've all had a few tricky moments over the past year, particularly around Covid, but we got through. We lost a dear friend and supporter in Bernard, but we continued our good works. We have achieved much to hold our heads high in the Rotary world and we have truly Served to Change Lives.

It has been an honour, pleasure and privilege to serve as your President.

PAUL HARRIS FELLOW AWARDS

The presentation of Paul Harris Fellowships is The Rotary Foundation's way of expressing its appreciation for a substantial contribution to its humanitarian and educational programs. It is named for our founder, Paul Harris, a Chicago lawyer who started Rotary International with three business associates in 1905. Paul Harris Fellow recognition was established in his honour in 1957, to recognise persons whose lives demonstrate a shared purpose with the objectives and mission of The Rotary Foundation to build world understanding and peace.

The Rotary Foundation programs provide educational opportunities, food, safe water, health care, immunizations, and shelter for millions of persons around the world.

There are two types of Paul Harris Fellowship; ones where the recipient makes a significant personal financial contribution to the Rotary Foundation and one where a Club makes a donation on behalf of someone for an award. We have one of each today.

We move closer to a world of peace and good will today as we have a member who becomes a **Paul Harris Fellow with 3 sapphires.** This is the second time in the club's history that a member has reached the mark, and this person's individual contribution represents more than \$USD4,000 in donations to the

Rotary Foundation.
