Guest Speaker:



KARYN KENNEDY

Our Guest speaker over breakfast was **Karyn Kennedy**, **advocate for the Hospital Research Foundation - Stroke**.

Club member Mark Thompson had a link to Karyn when they both worked in the Life Insurance Industry; Karyn working as an self employed adviser and as an employee for corporate institutions. Karyn was aged 52 and self-employed as an insurance adviser when she suffered a life changing stroke.

Karyn had none of the risk factors for stroke; high blood pressure, smoking, high cholesterol, diabetes, obesity, excess alcohol and drugs

and atrial fibrillation. So what could be the tigger? Her specialist suggested that the most likely culprit was linked to the heart and as it turned out, that was correct. Karyn had a congenital defect, a hole in the heart, which led to a blood clot that burst through her brain, creating damages in many areas of the brain, that controlled speech, movement, feeling and so on.

In the four years since the stroke Karyn has retrained her brain and moved from a wheel chair with an inability to tie her shoe laces to being able to drive and be an eloquent advocate for the Hospital Research Foundation - Stroke. Karyn suffers ongoing hypersensitivity to her left limbs as well as neuralgic pain, not to mention oesophageal issues. She is still unable to return to being a self employed adviser because of short term memory loss and other long term issues.

Fortunately, Karyn took our own advice and had in addition to income protection that will pay her until age 65, policies for lump sum payments for life threatening illnesses that included stroke and total and permanent disability (own occupation test, not any occupation).

Karyn left us with some interesting stats:

- if we can reduce just one of the risk factors outlined above we will significantly reduce the chance of having a stroke
- strokes kill more women than breast cancer and more men than prostate cancer
- 85% of strokes are ischaemic (blood clots rather than a haemorrhaged blood vessel in the brain)
- 1/2 million people now are Australian stroke survivors, but this is likely to increase to 1M by 2050
- 30% of stoke victims are under 65 and this figure is also increasing due to a sedentary life style, drugs and alcohol
- most stroke victims will suffer depression

Karyn reminded us of F.A.S.T. Watch out for the obvious symptoms of stoke, such as changes to the face, arms, speech and remember time. Recovery from stroke is time critical. There is a small window for giving a srtoke victim drugs that will dissolve a blood clot and if given soon enough there may be no long term disabilities (Karyn prefers the term ability - working with your abilities)

Karen thanked her husband Chris and children who made her recovery so much easier.

MEET THE NEW RI PRESIDENT - JENNIFER E. JONES



On the 1st July 2022 Rotary history was made when Jennifer Jones became the first woman Rotary International President. When I first joined Rotary soon after women were admitted into Rotary this would have been seen by many as an impossibility.

Things have indeed changed since those early days. The majority of clubs now welcome women, even though there are still a few which have held on tight to the men only rule.

We have seen women take on the roles of District Govenors and Club Presidents. This year in our district we have around twenty women presidents and to have a woman RI

President some thirty five years after the Rotary International constitutional change was made at the 1989 Council on Legislation, with a vote to eliminate the "male only" provision for all of Rotary, can only be applauded.

Jennifer is the founder and president of Media Street Productions, an award-winning 27-year-old media company in Windsor, Ontario. She is a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland. Jennifer's talents have strengthened Rotary's reach and impact as she has served in roles including vice president, director, Rotary Foundation trustee, and co-chair of the End Polio Now: Make History Today fundraising campaign.

Jennifer is a leader in cultivating experiential fundraising opportunities, such as a day of golfing with Rotary polio ambassador Jack Nicklaus in Jupiter, Florida, USA, that raised over \$5.25 million for polio eradication. She also led the innovative #RotaryResponds virtual event in May 2020, raising money for COVID-19 relief projects and showcased how Rotary members were responding to the pandemic around the world.

Working alongside political figures, celebrities, and global leaders, Jennifer has raised awareness and hundreds of millions of dollars to eradicate disease, support peace, and provide clean water and sanitation. An expert storyteller, she inspires hope and promise and motivates people to take action.

Jennifer has received the Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. She holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) and has been recognized with the YMCA Peace Medal and the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and was the first Canadian to receive the Wayne State University's Community Peacemaker Award.
