Guest Speaker: NOMIKI REBECCA THOMAS

Nomiki Thomas (in company with mum and former Rotarian, Maria) was this week's guest speaker at our breakfast meeting. Nomiki, aged 13 is a student at Pulteney Grammar, but prior to Pulteney she was a year 6 student at St Andrews at Walkerville.

Students had to decide on a project and Nomiki decided on writing a novel, which resulted in a novella entitled 'Goodbye'; with the cover designed by a graphic design aunty.

"Goodbye' is about a girl named Anna and Nomiki described the storyline as thriller/suspense. Prior to the project Nomiki interviewed two authors and a publisher. Children's author (8-12 years), Phil Cummings was particularly helpful. He told her to grab their attention straight away and if the theme is mystery and intrigue then not too much humour. Publisher, Anna Solding, encouraged Nomiki to use metaphors and similes. Another guide was women's author, Kate Loveday.

Part beneficiary of sales (\$20 per book) goes to the Indigenous Literary Foundation. Nomiki's aim is to raise \$1000 for that organisation. During question time Nomiki said that although the heroine is a girl, that boys also enjoyed the book.

The book is available at Dymocks and Dillons. We have offered Nomiki a spot at one of our Magill Markets at which to promote her book. Nomiki is about to start a second book.



The Indigenous Literacy Foundation

You may recall that today's speaker Nomiki is donating part of the proceeds of book sales to the Indigenous Literacy Foundation.

The Indigenous Literacy Foundation (ILF) is a national charity working with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander remote Communities across Australia. ILF responds to requests from remote Communities for culturally relevant books, including early learning board books, resources, and programs to support Communities to create and publish their stories in languages of their choice.

ILF's catch-cry is "Reading Opens Doors to future opportunities and choices"

CALPERUM VOLUNTEERS INFORMATION SESSION

Green Corner – presented by Ian and Suzette Coat

We were recently invited to attend a thank-you luncheon at Calperum for volunteers who help with such things as paddock management, collecting research data, and general maintenance. Most readers of this newsletter will know about Calperum Station, north of Renmark. If you don't, look it up on the Internet. The luncheon provided the opportunity for the station management to present information about their current progress and plans for the future. Calperum is currently looking to grow on the basis of its three pillars of Ecology, Education and Engagement. Heather Neilly, as senior ecologist has recently been awarded the 2021 Wiley Next Generation Ecologist Award for her work on how disturbances alter vegetation structure and affect fauna. We heard about the important role that Mallee fowl have in the ecosystem from Murraylands & Riverland Landscape Board Ecologist Craig Gillespie, and how the decommissioning of dams is reducing the feral pest population. Calperum is now providing TAFE Certificates III and IV in Ecology and is attracting some amazing young people who are passionate about making our environment a better place. The Calperum team currently provides unique tourist opportunities for campers, caravans and in their guest houses, but want to expand the options and include a caravan site off the river on firmer ground with more facilities. Rotary, and many other volunteer organisations and individuals, continue to be committed to helping Calperum flourish into a gem in the Riverland.

QUIZ QUESTION

What statue was designed by British sculptor Sir Charles Bell Birch, made from copper from Wallaroo and cast at the Thomas & Dutton Foundry in London? It stands on a pedestal 3.35m high made from red granite mined near Palmer in SA, and carved by Fraser & Dreysey of Waymouth Street, Adelaide. The statue was financed by Sir Edwin Thomas Smith and unveiled in 1894. The statue was relocated to its present position in 2014.

Answer: Queen Victoria's statue in Victoria Square.
