GUEST SPEAKER – SIMON KELLYReminiscences of an unretired Teacher

You may recall that that Simon Kelly spoke to us last May about the work of Aboriginal Veterans' SA (AVSA), touching on grave restoration and commemorative dedications to Aboriginal service veterans lying in unmarked graves. Good news: the new State Government has recognised the various projects undertaken by AVSA and recently provided it with three years funding to the tune of \$78,000, paid in advance, for its grave restoration program. This has removed much of the pressure on AVSA, having to continually compete for grants.

Simon's longest teaching stint was 28 years at Rostrevor College, followed by Catholic Education and Xavier Gawler. Simon was then coerced out of retirement to teach again at St Francis Xavier's Wynn Vale. Simon prefers teaching History to years 7 through 12.

Simon told us it was the best feeling to raise up a child's marks from below average to average and above. Teachers who get a kick out of improving the poor student can end up in conflict with the school's goal of raising the overall grades of the good student to the level of excellent, in other words job satisfaction v school image. This dilemma was touched on recently in the morning paper. Sometimes improving a child's performance can be as simple of identifying a square peg in round hole. Simon related Sir Ken Robinson's story (find on TED) of a hyperactive girl, who could not settle in class. A psychologist left her alone in a room with music playing while the child's mother and the psychologist looked on through a one-way mirror.

The psychologist said the cure was simple; move her to a Dance School. The girl then went on to great things. Simon had a similar experience while a relief teacher. He allowed a hyperactive boy to mess around in the corner of the room left to his own devices, but when he had to hand back to class to the regular teacher, they boy could relate most of the oral info that Simon had imparted over a number of weeks. In addition, he gave us some anecdotes like 'swear box' and examples of a child's ability to think laterally to recognising the horrors of war.

Simon finished off with an embarrassing moment when as a trainee teacher, he boarded the bus from Athelstone at Evandale and while strap hanging one of the year 9 girls at the school he was teaching loudly told a bawdy gag to her classmates from the back of the bus. As passengers alighted in the city Simon was now visible to the young storyteller who then cried out in a loud voice, 'Hello Mr Kelly'. The remaining passengers then all focused-on Simon, probably thinking 'Do you actually teach this vulgar kid?'

Thanks, Simon, for taking us through some of your memorable teaching moments.

Answer: Catherine the Great of Russia

It was during Catherine's reign that the first-ever inoculation (an early version of vaccination), designed to protect against smallpox, was invented. A lover of science and all the advances brought forth by the Enlightenment, the monarch embraced this medical innovation with open arms, becoming the first person in Russia to undergo the procedure in 1768, and then she promptly deemed anyone who didn't get inoculated an idiot.

ICE BREAKER

It has probably been close on 20 years since the idea of water banking was first raised. In Australia we don't have to build massive concrete water tanks or dams to store water because we have the largest aquifer in the world – The Great Artesian Basin, and this along with the

Murray Darling Basin would hold more water than we would ever need, without the risk of evaporation. Over the past couple of years we have had our fair share of droughts and flooding rains, but, still on the driest continent, we still do no closer to water banking. Politicians think it is a good idea during a drought but forget about it as soon as it rains.

The expense is always toted as a reason for in activity but in August 2022 it was estimated losses in Australia due to natural causes between 2022-2050 would be in the region of \$452 billion.

At the moment the country is in the grip of La Nina and has water everywhere, but we have been warned La Nini is on its way with an increased fire threat, drought and challenging heat.

Should we be storing water in our natural aquifers now and in effect drought proofing the country and help to eliminate flooding, regardless of the expense?

Do you think the Australian Government should be seriously looking into this proposal?

Response:


This generated quite a bit of discussion, however, I don't think we actually answered the questions.

There was some concern that by introducing extra water into the aquifers, especially flood water, may contaminate the aquifer and could block it.

It was generally decided the science stacked up but there was some concern on cost.

The main discussion centred around the aquifers in the Campbelltown area and how they were being used at present. There is one under the Max Amber Sports Field.




