Guest Speaker: JOHN FLYNN — "BEHIND THE BADGE"

Cr John Flynn's "Behind the Badge", could best be described as 'what hasn't this man done?'

John was born in Creswick, Victoria, just north of Ballarat. Nowadays, Creswick is known for its quality woollen mill and scenic walks. John was one of eight siblings and a twin. With so many mouths to feed' living on rabbits and produce grown in the home garden was the primary source of nourishment.



Dad was a builder, and the four boys all went to technical high schools, helping dad with his building jobs. Sports were John's main interest and at age 16 he applied for employment with the Commonwealth Bank but was not accepted.

He then applied for a Cadetship with Victoria Police and was accepted. During this period, he completed his HSC. In January 1979 John graduated from the Academy, but as it turned out he was only aged seventeen and a half, too young to be sworn in, so he sat in the back of police cars and observed for six months. When he was sworn in, his first task was to attend a triple murder at the Supreme Court. Being first on the scene he eventually spent six weeks on call as a witness in the triple murder

trial. John served for 25 years and had many roles, like Senior Sergeant at Sunshine.

Regular changes to postings meant John joined various service clubs as well as being captain coach of football and cricket clubs.

John's attitude to study changed over the years and he qualified for various diploma courses such as management and police studies. John spent 13 years as senior investigator for sexual assaults. He transferred to Gaming Squad as an Inspector and had to learn every possible way to gamble. We were surprised to learn that Bingo was a common way to wash illegal money. Who would have guessed?

After resigning from the Police, John embraced the corporate world. He has written a book on how to run a successful business, and a book on Road Traffic. He owned several Cartridge World stores and has trained business employees in the USA. For many years John ran a successful food outlet at TTP. He and his wife, Made are proprietors of "The Perfect Blend Café" with the help of their two children.

Through marriage John has many relatives in Bali, which had its economy wiped out by Covid. Malnutrition and starvation had set in, and John and family decided to raise money to feed those in need with packages of essential foods. Using local suppliers John has got the cost per package down to \$10. With locals having to pay \$60 for each vaccination they have put food ahead of vaccines, so the incidence of covid was high in Bali. Well done John and family. I'm sure our club can help with this worthwhile venture.





Green Corner – Rotary District 9510

We have been very fortunate over the last few months to be made more aware of the many environmental initiatives being run by Rotary Clubs in D9510. Last weekend, Past Rotary International World President, Ian Risley, visited Adelaide and

District 9510 more generally, to talk about his current role as Chair of the Rotary Foundation and to hear more about our environmental projects. You may remember that during his tenure as Rotary International President Ian Risley asked that a tree be planted for each of the 1.2 million Rotarians. The Rotary community took him up on that challenge and planted many times more that number.

On Saturday afternoon an Environmental Forum was held to showcase many projects from around the District. The projects ranged from replacing plastic straws with Rotary-branded paper straws in the Glenelg tourist precinct to the varied work being undertaken at Calperum Station that engages members from 31 different Rotary Clubs. The passion expressed by the presenters around their projects and the measurable outcomes were impressive.



On the Sunday, I was fortunate to be part of a group showing Ian Risley around some of these projects in the field. The first was RC Seaford and the building of microbat boxes for use in an ecovineyard near Tatachilla, as a way of reducing the pests on the grapes. The boxes are very specific to



microbats and the project also included the planting of shrubs that attract insectivorous birds and other animals to reduce the pest population and eliminate the need for spraying insecticide.

The second visit was to RC Goolwa and their native revegetation program in one of the less well managed open spaces in Goolwa. The shrubs selected are all native to the area. Digging holes is fraught with risk of hitting a large limestone outcrop. A success rate of one in three holes was mentioned. Ian Risley was invited to plant the 101st tree.

Ian stated on numerous occasions, everywhere he visited, that the breadth and depth of environmental projects our District is engaged in far surpasses anything he has seen before. This is testament to the imagination, determination and generosity of Rotarians in District 9510.
