Guest Speaker: Dr. MARK THOMPSON



Mark is an occupational therapist with extensive experience in ageing, rehabilitation, palliative care, and Aboriginal health and ageing. He is the director of an allied health practice which is focused on the delivery of community based aged care.

Mark is an adjunct lecturer and researcher with the University of Adelaide's medical school. His research is focused on frailty and sarcopenia in acute and residential care, together with the primary care management of older adults. Mark completed a PhD in 2019 which examined frailty at population level in Australia.

Aboriginal Health & Aged Care

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders account for 3.3% of the Australian population. Life expectancy is 9 years lower for Aboriginal Australians compared to the general population (men 72 years vs 81; and women 76 years vs 85).

Good health from an Aboriginal perspective is more than the absence of disease or illness; it includes physical, social, emotional, cultural, and spiritual wellbeing, for both the individual and the community. Aboriginal people are affected by more frequently and at a younger age by chronic diseases. Disruptions to family connections are also common with 31% experiencing high level psychological distress. Health status has a flow on effect to ageing and aged care. Aged care needed at a younger age (50+ eligibility for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders.

All Australians access aged care services via My Aged Care (MAC), a nationally coordinated call centre and single database. However, there can be barriers for Aboriginal Elders navigating MAC with many missing out on receiving appropriate services.

There are a number of social complexities that need to be taken into account when determining level of aged care approval for Elders, including: Limited Support Network; Difficulty engaging with mainstream service providers; Complex family situations; Psychological distress (grief / loss / family trauma); Domestic / Family Violence / Elder Abuse; Squalor; Substance misuse; Homeless / Risk of Homelessness; Poverty; Problems with police /correctional services; and Extremely remote geography.

Elders have a strong preference for aged care services to be delivered by Aboriginal controlled organisations which understand these complexities and attempt to address them, as well as support the common Roles of Aboriginal Elders. Some of these roles include supporting kinship, providing support, & inter-generational connection; passing down cultural knowledge; education and childcare / supporting young people; and community relations. Many Elders are long term guardians for grand-children, and board members for community organizations, and deliver cultural education programs. This can be very demanding on top of managing their own age-related disabilities and health conditions.

Non-Aboriginal clinical staff working in Aboriginal Primary Health and Aged Care need to use a partnership approach that draws upon the cultural expertise of Aboriginal staff combined with With their own clinical expertise to deliver a culturally safe service that is also clinically effective.

Proceeds from this market will go to **OPERATION FLINDERS** an organisation which exists to transform the lives of young people through quality remote outback adventure programs.





The Gums Landcare Group opening event for the year was held on Sunday 26th March. President Gerry Butler honoured the six patrons Ivan "Tiwu" Copley, Peter Clark, Geoff Fisher, John Stuart and Bianca Amato (Lyn Robins being absent).

Uncle Ivan was presented with a plaque to the Kaurna People, mounted on a piece of bark by the artist John Stuart, who also offered him a beautiful carved walking stick in olive wood.

Furthermore, the proposal to endorse "The Voice" was discussed with questions and answers and accepted by consensus at the workshop.

President Lindsay was there to represent the Rotary Club of Magill Sunrise's commitment to the group with financial help to complete a shed at the joint site of the Newton Community Garden and the Community Landcare Nursery. The shed will store equipment; provide shelter whilst they develop the garden; and provides catchment of rainwater for the garden. Proceeds from our March market were ear marked for this cause.

To finish the event, there was a presentation from the 'EcoWarriors' from 1973, who at that time, at the age of 12/13, stopped the concrete lining of the Third Creek through The Gums. They organised a petition which was heard by the Council, preventing the works going ahead and leaving the Creek as we know it today.
