Guest Speaker: ADRIAN FERRARETTO



With a background in renewable energy (The Solar Shop and Tindo) Adrian's other passion is the motor car and nowadays the electric car.

With an encyclopaedic knowledge Adrian surprised us with some interesting historical facts. The first electric car was commercially available in 1888 and was treated as a replacement for the horse with its limited speed and range. The electric car progressed through the years.

Even Henry Ford's wife preferred Ford's electric car because she didn't have to crank the handle to turn over the motor.

In 1912 the invention of the starter motor for the internal combustion engine put a halt to further development on EVs because no one had to

crank the handle unless the battery went flat.

Two thousand and one saw the introduction of the Indian electric vehicle the Reva. Adrian tried to introduce the vehicle into SA, but bureaucratic resistance beat him.

Adrian went through the evolution of the Tesla up to the present. He compared the performance of a \$300,000 Tesla with a \$3M Bugatti and the Tesla won hands down.

Adrian drives an electric vehicle, which has a range of around 500 km and which he recharges at home via his solar panels. His recent road trip to Melbourne (ironically to watch Formula One) required one 10-minute stop to recharge.

One EV that he still has fond memories for is the Nissan Leaf, introduced in 2013. Adrian also demonstrated that with the removal of GST on novated car leasing the electric vehicle comes out ahead with leasing, fuel, and maintenance.

Adrian sees a future where we will summon a driverless EV from a pool of vehicles, maybe like the scooters that we see dumped around the city after their use. Wouldn't that be great for the elderly. In summary Adrian says EVs:

are faster, cheaper (than a hybrid), cheaper to run and maintain, have greater efficiency with lower emissions.
