GUEST SPEAKER: MARCO DI GIROLAMO

In June 2022, Marco Di Girolamo was our guest speaker when told us about his experiences with South Pacific School Aid (SPSA) and in particular a dedicated ship to provide aid to towns and villages in Papua & New Guinea.

Today he gave us an update. Marco and wife Sue are well known at our monthly market with their second hand book stall raising funds to SPSA.

Marco explained that in addition to the Pacific SPSA also sends aid to Africa but is more focused on the Pacific.

They are reactive more than proactive and prefer to respond to requests. Last year they delivered 66 pallets of books. Even with assistance this costs \$25,000.

Since 2017, their SA warehouse has been situated at Underdale, which is rent free. SPSA has three fund raising centres in SA with book sales being the biggest earner (just under \$6,000) last year.

SPSA relies on good will from Jurique for pallets, Propak for plastic wrapping and Aged Care for cardboard boxes. Marco said it is essential to work with volunteer and charity/religious groups at the receiving end.

Greed and vindictiveness can see donations disappear as happened for the Roma (gypsies) of Serbia when clothes from Scotch College students were blocked. Indonesia and Africa have bad track records too.

Due to frequent cyclones and flimsy buildings. book supplies must be frequently replaced. SPSA once replaced an entire science lab post cyclone in Fiji and every student passed.

SPSA's latest project is to support a new college on P&NG's north coast which will be focused on nursing, teaching and theology.

Well done, Marco.
