GUEST SPEAKER: JUSTIN KAHL



In a North American indigenous culture, our guest speaker may have been given the name *Two Hats* because, in addition to Justin Kahl's role of Executive General Manager of Sage Automation, he is also Vice President of Heccies Sports and Community Club.

Justin gave a brief bio of his rise from teenage student earning pocket money, leading to apprentice electrician to eventually his current role of Executive General Manager for Sage Automation.

Asking for a show hands, not all knew about Sage Automation, so Justin told us to think of the auto lighting etc. in the Heysen Tunnel, mining at Iron Knob of things that open and shut or mix in wineries.

Justin has been with Sage for 30 years, ever since its inception. The name Sage is not linked to a herb or wisdom, but is an acronym for **S**culpted, **A**nd, **G**rogan, **E**lectrical. The two founders, Paul and Andrew started the business as a backyard operation, with both moonlighting at weekends.

When it came the time to go full time, Paul resigned and continued with the Railways and Andrew remained to create a global business (one of the largest of its type in the world) with 750 Australian employees and another 50 in India.

Justin made some interesting observations about Defence contracts, my interpretation was 'build it and they will come' (albeit they come slowly or perhaps never). One of the company's mantras is to never to have more than 20% of their business in one sector and this especially applies to Defence.

We are all familiar with the term, 'The Valley of Death' when it comes to ship building. Justin said it's always a battle to keep overseas and interstate operations from poaching (my word) their traditional SA markets. Sage is currently working on integrating renewable energy into existing operations, like sewerage.

The firm has a strong graduate and apprentice program, but it is a battle to retrain and attract good people. One feel good story was about employee Cassie Hames, a programmer who is legally blind. To overcome her difficulty with stopping the correct bus and alighting at the right stop she has developed an app that overcomes both issues (feature article in Adelaide Advertiser). Her "See Me" app is being trialled and likely to be adopted.

Wearing his other hat as VP at Heccies,

Justin (who just lives a couple of streets from the clubrooms) proudly listed the club's achievements is five tiers of sports: Football (being the most popular), Cricket, Netball, Tennis and Basketball (off site).

The tennis courts will be expanded by another two. Heccies caters for 1400 participants, but swells to over 4000 when parents, grandparents and friends become involved. What a fantastic community achievement.

Heccies is always on the lookout for more volunteers (preaching to the converted here Justin). Justin (who is built like a cattle dog) still plays Over 35s football and then tried recruiting from those assembled for this activity; you could hear knees popping at the very thought.

Over one million tickets sold last year (& the first festival to ever do it). 2024 is already reporting a 25% increase.

\$25M in box office sales last year, with \$24M paid out to artists.

45,000 visitors attracted to SA in 2023

6,500 artists, 1,340 shows, 517 venues
