Bet was impressed with Michael Crossland's address: The Power of Perspective. Born with cancer and an early life of isolation in his home at Coffs Harbour, Michael's mother encouraged him to be resilient. Always wanting to play sport like the other kids, Michael's dream of playing college basketball in the USA were dashed when he suffered a heart attack prior to departure on a scholarship. As he matured, he went from financial Wizkid to losing the lot and having to move with his mum from a mansion to a caravan.

Not discouraged by the removal of six tumours in 2022 he continued as a full-time motivational speaker.

Bet also found the Clubs 'Soapbox' moments very informative, where each club could strut their stuff re project and upcoming events. Bet also said The Current Reality of Ukraine - New Dawn Project (Odessa) was informative.

Ian thought that the Youth Alumni presentation a stimulus for something that our club could pursue re attending of the various youth programs that we sponsor. Ian also addressed us on one of the Rotary Areas of Focus, **The Environment**.

Rotary International has already spent \$23M on the Environment. Ian expanded on other issues like Community Action for Fresh Water and Calperum, the latest Rotary environmental project of its kind in Australia. A bit of history; Calperum was sold to the Chicago Zoo in 1993 and then donated to the SA Government.

Continuing with a River Murray theme, Simon B presented an idea that he and Pauline have been working on: a 4-day Riverboat adventure for the Club.

Our **Peace Pole** has now been installed in Nightingale Park. A Peace Pole is a monument that displays the message "May Peace Prevail On Earth" in the language of the country where it is placed. The message is referred to as an **affirmation of peace** and its placement furthers **Rotary's goal of building a culture of peace throughout the world.**

Peace Poles are intended to inspire unity among people of all cultures, ethnicities, and backgrounds. It is estimated there are over **250,000 Peace Poles,** in every country in the world, dedicated as monuments to peace.




LOOKING GOOD


To keep you looking good:


