CLUB ASSEMBLY




President Lindsay took the opportunity to provide a comprehensive report on matters covered during last week's Board meeting. It was a clear indication of how many activities are being delivered by our club in our community; how much support is provided by our club for worthwhile causes; and how many great initiatives are being planned by our club.

Examples include – Donations to the Epilepsy Centre and to Polio Plus and to Shelter Box and Operation Flinders and AFADU; simplifying the registration process for market stallholder bookings & payments; rebranding and launching the Coin Slider; continuing support for the Magill RSL; kicking off plans for the Lift the Lid Walk; Support for Adelaide East Domestic Violence; providing DV Safe Phones; and preparing for (3) new members.



We then stepped out to review some of the work being done by our closest neighbours – the Area 8 Rotary Clubs. They can also boast a long and impressive list of achievements; community programs; student support; health and environmental initiatives. Some have amazing benefits – including over \$33,000 raised for a new school in Ukraine; and over \$50,000 raised from a single community BBQ.



Given that the Regionalisation Pilot aims "to significantly increase the reach and impact of Rotary in Australia" – it has a great foundation to build upon.

The meeting wrapped up with a simple overview of the Regionalisation Pilot objectives.

This week is National Volunteer week, with the theme of "Something for Everyone". It was reported in the papers over the weekend that South Australian organisations are hoping to re-engage with volunteers after Covid diminished their workforce. Across Australia

there are now 2 million fewer volunteers compared to pre pandemic levels. Our Govt is working with organisations to help them build more flexibility and inclusiveness into volunteer roles. Volunteers just want to feel that they're doing something and by making it as easy possible, people will feel their volunteering is doing something good.



Activities will include a focus on sustainable water management and irrigation practices, salinity issues, environmental flows, conservation, land degradation and rehabilitation and more!

Throughout the program participants will be exposed to challenges and scenarios which help develop a range of skills essential for not only science work, but also everyday life. These include: **Team work**, **Analytical thinking**, **Research Methodology**, **Data collection and Reporting**.

This 5-day camp brings together students from across three states and *includes fun and* social activities that will bond the students together and provide lasting memories of this special opportunity.


