DISABILITY SERVICES
WHERE PEOPLE COME FIRST

GUEST SPEAKER: MANISH KUMAR



Our guest speaker was Manish Kumar from Kangaroo Disability Services in Paradise who told us about his journey from his birthplace in India to his new home in Australia. Manish recently attended our Peace Pole unveiling ceremony in Nightingale Park where we included a peace message in Hindi, symbolic of the Indian born population in Campbelltown now standing at 4.9% compared to 3.1% in greater Adelaide and 2.5% in S.A. (2021 census figures).

Manish came from a village just 10km away from the Pakistan border in the Western Thar Desert. He is part of the Bishnoi community who are well known for their communion with nature. Bishnoi literally translates to twenty-nine, and the

community live by 29 commandments or principles that date back to the 1500s.

The Bishnoi detests any cruelty to animals and damage to the environment. Hence in 1730 when the Maharaja of Jodhpur wanted to build a new palace and ordered the trees cut down in that area, a woman named Amrita Devi literally hugged a tree to try to save it but was brutally beheaded by the king's men. This led to a massacre that saw 363 other Bishnoi killed including Amrita's three daughters all in the name of saving the trees. It is believed that the term "tree hugger" referring to a committed environmentalist dates from this event. They saved the trees at an enormous cost.

As a young lad Manish never considered leaving his homeland, but his father talked much about the benefits of seeing the world and seeking out new experiences. Living very close to the border of Pakistan where there was much conflict he wanted to join the Army when he grew up to fight the people who were portrayed as "enemies" to him. He now has many Pakistani friends and knows that this characterisation was not true. At the age of 23 Manish headed to Australia. When he arrived, he could barely speak a word of English and did not know anyone. He took up a job as a taxi driver which he found was excellent to learn both English and Australian culture. He became very interested in Aussie Rules and adopted Port Power as his favourite team (ed: proving he is an astute judge of character with impeccable taste!)

Life was very hard for him in those early years, and he slept on the floor in a shared house to save money. He eventually worked in disability support and has now been in that industry for 15 years. About three years ago he noted a gap in the support area and decided to establish his own support service with his wife: Kangaroo Disability Services. He chose the name Kangaroo because of his Bishnoi beliefs in the sanctity of animals recognising that is probably the most important and well-known Australian animal.

The main tenet of his business is to provide a "familiar face" to the care recipients. This offers them the advantage of someone who actually knows them and knows their needs well. The business has now grown to service about 20 clients through the NDIS scheme and has 23 carers and three or four administration staff. 30% of his clients are from multicultural backgrounds and amongst his employees 7 languages are spoken. Their offices are on the corner of Lower NE and Darley Roads. As a local resident Manish knew that the previous business on that site was famous for their placards with inspirational sayings on them, so although the signs had been removed from the previous tenants, he restored them and keeps an inspirational weekly saying on them. He relayed a story that a person rang recently saying that they were suffering extreme depression and were contemplating the unthinkable one morning on their way to work, but then happened by the inspirational message on his sign that made them reconsider their position in a new light and helped them out of it. Never underestimate how little things can make a big difference.

Manish's story was way more than any of us expected. We learned so much about a fascinating part of India that we would otherwise never have heard of, and an amazing story of a person who has embraced their new home and is making a major contribution

to our community. A truly inspiring presentation.

Some famous pranks related to the day are:



- In 1958, a rhinoceros called "Cacareco" (Portuguese for "rubbish") won a city council seat in São Paulo, Brazil with 100,000 votes, due to a campaign led by students who were tired of the city's mismanagement.
- In 1978, newspapers & radio stations were abuzz when electronics millionaire and adventurer Dick
 Smith towed what appeared to be an iceberg into Sydney Harbour. He said that he'd towed it from
 Antarctica to solve Sydney's water shortage, and he'd be cutting it up & selling delicious ice cubes for
 10c each. Unfortunately, it then rained, revealing the iceberg to be a barge covered in plastic,
 firefighting foam & shaving cream.
- Spaghetti trees: The BBC television programme Panorama ran a hoax in 1957, purporting to show the Swiss harvesting spaghetti from trees. Hopefully we all came away with some great ideas on how to make our clubs relevant and more exciting.






















NEW EDITION TO OUR PEACE POLE IN NIGHTINGALE RESERVE


