In fact, the Rotary South Pacific Regionalisation Pilot Program is a change we are all embarking on and it is looking positive, but only time will tell. Sometimes we just need to move away from our comfort zones.

It's important to recognise that the decline in Rotary membership is not necessarily a reflection of lack of interest in joining, but rather a reflection of changing workplace commitments and lifestyles. We need as Rotary Clubs to adapt be flexible and provide a club fit for purpose.

U3A - University of the 3rd Age

A Rotarian for over 30 years Glenda will share the story of U3A and what it can offer to those of us in our "third age" – people over 50 years of age, working less than 20 hours per week.

CLUB ASSEMBLY

A club assembly is an opportunity for all club members to reflect on and discuss club meetings, projects and activities. As our meetings are only one hour in duration a club assembly is crucial to ensure all club members are aware of what is occurring in our committees and to invite member feedback and to brainstorm ideas for projects and activities. Keeping members connected is key to maintaining a healthy, energized club.

We discussed our plan to add an evening meeting to our agenda and the benefits we hope to achieve by making this change.

Suzette bought us up to date with our International Project in Zimbabwe. As a club we have committed to building teacher accommodation at the Lirhanzo Children's Village. The aim of this project is to lift children out of poverty through education. Education promotes economic growth because it provides skills that increase employment opportunities and income. Nearly 60 million people could escape poverty if all adults had just two more years of schooling, and 420 million people could be lifted out of poverty if all adults completed secondary education, according to UNESCO.

Education increases earnings by roughly 10% per each additional year of schooling. The building of teacher accommodation means the Lirhanzo Children's Village can access three more teachers and provide high school education.

We are looking at making this a RAWCS project in our own right and offering a tax deduction to those who donate.

Godfrey is in the process of putting together a Go Fund Me page to supplement this project. We are in the process of arranging a social event to raise money eg a Quiz Night or dinner. The proceeds from the selling of hot cross buns and lamingtons will go to the International Project.

Alison told us about the fleecy jackets which will be ideal for the market especially as winter is approaching. The details of these can be found in this Bulletin so if you would like to be snuggly warm this winter please contact Alison. We will be having the club logo embroidered on them.

Ian gave us an overview of "Health of the River" and the plan to involve schools within our catchment area and to include clubs from Victoria, especially Ballarat.

"Health of the River" is a program for students focusing on ecology, conservation and the environment. It is a five-day hands-on learning experience held at Calperum Station just out of Renmark. It is open to students in years nine and ten and includes transportation, accommodation, meals and an exceptional learning experience. Ian said that students will be encouraged to apply as soon as costs have been released and the dates set for 2025.













QUIZ QUESTION

Q: What is petrichor?

A: The smell of rain fallen on dry ground. Unfortunately, it's a smell we haven't experienced much for some time, but hopefully we'll all experience some petrichor before much longer. Amazingly the word is an Australian invention coined by CSIRO Scientists Isabel Joy Bear (1927-2021) and Dick Thomas (1901-1974). They were the first to scientifically describe the smell of rain. They gave it the name petrichor from Greek origins of "petra" meaning rock and "ikhor" from the ethereal fluid that is the blood of the Gods in Greek mythology.

Mark asked what causes the smell. It seems that when a raindrop lands on a porous surface, air from the pores form small bubbles, which float to the surface and release aerosols to the air. The aerosols carry the scent along with viruses and bacteria. Slower moving raindrops produce more aerosols, which is why petrichor is more prevalent after light rains. Thank you, Mr Wikipedia, for that one.



ICE BREAKER

Q: Related to our quiz, the big dry continues with many people suffering in places where they are not on mains water and cannot even get water delivered. Is this just a passing thing or should more be done to prepare for future events?

This brought on an interesting conversation. Most people were quite aware of the suffering felt by many because of this, but it also raised some curious questions, such as part of Mylor apparently being on mains and the other not. Also, some towns down south near the Myponga Reservoir are also not on mains water, which seems incongruous. Partly though it was noted that there have been a lot of people move to semi-rural areas where there is no access to mains.

It was noted that some people have had no choice but to also use their fire water reserves, which creates another serious risk. The link with the mass fish kills on the southern coast was also noted, which seems to have been caused by the warmer weather and extended dry spell.

Installing more rainwater storage seemed like one of the solutions, but that would depend upon the area you have available and the roof space to capture enough water.

Some large water bills were also noted with one of Pauline & Colin's neighbours having received a quarterly bill in excess of \$2,000. Some of us also noted that even with a very small garden or lawn bills pushing \$1,000 were not uncommon. Ouch!

Hopefully the dry will break soon and we can get back to a bit of normality.



In 2025, we will ask walkers to bring a gift or make a donation of money towards goods that help survivors establish their new homes. With an estimated 1,000+ walkers, this practical response could be huge.

We also strive to build education within our younger generations to stamp out generational learned behaviour passed down from parents to their children.

We thank clubs who donated to the Walk in 2023 and 2024.

These Club donations, combined with an establishment grant from District 9510, plus corporate sponsorships has helped our committee cover costs.

The walk itself is quite a simple concept, however, there are many expenses that combined, add up to a considerable sum. There are unavoidable promotional costs; production of quality banners and signs; hire of pro-quality sound systems; Council permits; First Aid fees; Band fees; Seating + more

Moving forward, we want to have a Rotary Walk For Respect Day on the South Australian calendar annually and we can expect it to cost around \$25,000 p.a. to keep this going.

With the financial help of each dub - with an average annual donation of \$500 per club - we can secure the future of the Walk, plus the new initiatives we are launching. For example, we would like to use the event to support creative pop-up projects on the day. This could be something from your Club.

Should excess funds be collected, the Committee will initially hold funds in reserve to underwrite the future of the Walk. However, at a later stage, accumulated funds can be put towards other DV initiatives.

We are happy to talk to you about your ideas. But thank you for your consideration of this investment.


