PRESIDENT'S REPORT



This week the club celebrated 29 years since our charter on the 14th of May 1996. We

were chartered by the Rotary Club of Morialta, and it was perhaps fitting some of us joined with our mother club on our birthday to hear Stephen Pallaras speak on Domestic Violence. A birthday to a Rotary Club is a significant occasion as it highlights the fact the club is still

active and able to do good in the world, especially these days when it is becoming more difficult to recruit volunteers.

We have a lot to be proud of as a club. Our members are enthusiastic and hard working and over the 29 years we have made a difference and changed lives.

In no particular order and by no means all we have done, but since chartering we have provided money to train four midwives at the Hamlin's Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital in Ethiopia to increase access to fistula repair services for women living in rural areas.

We have provided cows to the Zaidi ya Dreams orphanage in Kenya to help with their self-sufficiency, given funds to ShelterBox to assist in emergency shelter and tools for families robbed of their homes by disaster or conflict thereby transforming despair into hope, provided an educational program to help eradicate Leprosy in East Timor and we continue to support the Lirhanzo Children's Village in Zimbabwe.

The club has donated to the Hutt Street Centre, Puddle Jumpers, Vinnies and the Salvation Army to help improve lives especially the homeless. We support Operation Flinders which exists to transform the lives of "at risk" teens through quality remote outback adventure programs.

We have supported Australian Rotary Health so they may continue their research into mental health issues and have helped conduct "Lift the Lid" walks to raise awareness of mental health within the community.

As a club we have helped change people's lives for the better and will continue to do so with the money we raise at our monthly market. Your support at our market enables us to do so much more to make the world a better place, so to you I say thank you.

GUEST SPEAKERS: YUNG XIN & NIHS ANZAC MALTA ROWING TEAM



There was a strong link with Norwood International High School at this week's morning meeting. First up, Yung Xin was the recipient of our club's Service Above Self Award. Yung, then a Year 12 student at Norwood, was a prefect and along with other prefects set up regular programs for fellow students, one being 'Are you OK'. Yung is now in his first year at Adelaide University, aiming at a BA in Science.

Following Yung were the Norwood International High School' members of the Malta Trip, who spent the last school break in Malta participating in coastal rowing/racing.

But why Malta? This tiny Mediterranean island, just south of Sicily, was used to treat and recuperate wounded Anzacs during WWI.

Participating in various races with teams from New Zealand and Malta was one way to honour veterans who spent time on the island. Australia's High Commissioner for Malta hosted the students for an Anzac Day memorial ceremony. Some of the students had the opportunity to wear service medals of relatives. The students also spent some time tidying up the surrounds of Australia House, which was recently saved from demolition.

As far as the costal racing, well team New Zealand were dominant, but never the less, it was still a lot of fun. It was the first time the students had actually used the boats designed for coastal rowing in choppy conditions. The course was slalom design with singles, doubles and quads races with novelty races like boys v



girls. Boats were supplied by University of Malta. The students posing in the photo are Julissa, Noah, Ben, Scarlet and Rohan (not in named in any particular order). Tom, one of the six who also

went to Malta was absent, having moved on to an apprenticeship. Teacher, Emily also helped with the presentation, with some of the parents of the students in attendance.

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QUIZ QUESTION

Q: We have trivia questions and facts all the time at Rotary including last week's lengthy list and President Pauline's weekly "Did you know?", but what is the origin of the word "trivia"?

A: Of course, the answer itself is trivia, which nowadays means information and data that are considered to be of little value. Nonetheless, Godfrey came through with the exact answer – it derived from a word that effectively meant commonplace or a place to gossip. A more detailed answer & timeline follows, full or trivia of course!

The Romans first coined the term triviae to describe where one road split into two roads, so it literally translates to "three roads", but it was used to describe something that was commonplace.

In medieval Latin, the trivia (singular trivium) came to refer to the lower division of the Artes Liberales: grammar, rhetoric, and logic. These were the topics of basic education and were foundational to the quadrivia of higher education: arithmetic, geometry, music, and astronomy.

By the late 16th Century, the word trivial had been coined meaning "trite, commonplace, unimportant, slight", notably in the works of Shakespeare.

It's modern meaning comes from a 1902 book called "Trivialities, Bits of Information of Little Consequence." Again, it faded into disuse until revived in 1965 via a column in the Columbia Daily Spectator named Trivia that spurned the formation of trivia contests. This all led to the creation of the Trivial Pursuit game in 1982. You may now delete this knowledge!

Simon noted that his favourite piece of useless trivia is that President Harry S Truman's middle name was actually "S", with Mark noting similar for Ulyssess S Grant.


We then heard that the origin of the term "Out of sorts" referred to the printing industry where the letters were called "sorts", so when they ran out it would cause great disruption.

PRESIDENT'S - "DID YOU KNOW?"

We have all just seen the election of Pope Leo XIV, but who was Leo 1st?

Pope Leo was Pope from the 29th of September 440 until the 10th of November 461AD. Leo was his birth name. He was one of three popes to be given the title "The Great" – Pope Leo "The Great".

He was the 45th pope in the Catholic Church and is best known for meeting Attila the Hun and convincing him not to invade Italy in 452AD.

Out of the 14 Pope Leo's five have been made saints including Leo 1. In 1754 Pope Benedict XIV recognised Pope Leo as a Doctor of the Church. He is one of only two popes with this honour, the other being Pope Gregory 1st.



Pope Leo 1 is buried in the south transept of St Peter's Basilica.
