PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Rotary shares an interest in protecting our common legacy: the **ENVIRONMENT**. The Environment is the seventh area of Rotary's focus and over

the past three years Foundation global grant funding of \$US9 million has been allocated to protect our planet.

On the $5^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ of June it is the UN World Environment Day, an

ENVIRONMENT organisation Rotary International supports and it encourages Rotarians to involve their communities to help improve the environment which is under constant threat.

This year's theme is: **Ending Plastic Pollution**. The aim of this theme is to highlight the growing issue of plastic pollution, which extends beyond things like the discarded drink bottles we see cluttering streets. Microplastics are a new kind of pollution, and they have already spread to our food, our drinking water, and even into our own bodies.

As part of our District 9510 commitment to improving the River Murray we will be holding the **Health Of The River Youth Forum** this year from Mon 15th Sept - Fri 19th Sep 2025 at Calperum Station. This five-day forum provides hands on learning and mentoring from specialist ecologists and researchers on a working conservation and research property, with an emphasis on "River Health" for students in Years 9 and 10.

Activities will include a focus on sustainable water management and irrigation practices, salinity issues and environmental flows, conservation, land degradation and rehabilitation and more.

GUEST SPEAKER: NIH PRINCIPAL – ROY PAGE

This week's speaker was Roy Page, Principal of Norwood International High School. Although born in Townsville, QLD, Roy's roots are well entrenched in SA having attended Glossop Primary and High Schools as well as a stint at Coober Peddy.

Embracing teaching as a profession, some of Roy's appointments have been Deputy Head, Coulsdon in Surrey, UK, introducing academic programs that included those for Special Needs students.

Back in SA he has been Deputy Principal at the Heights School, Modbury, working on Strategic Planning, and then Principal at Heathfield High.

In January this year Roy was appointed as Principal of Norwood International High School (NIHS). Roy covered much with his in-depth presentation so this summary cannot do justice to every topic. Roy went on to say that of the 1,600 years 7 -12 students there are 95 nationalities of which 150 are international students.

Roy started with an illustration from the turn of the 20th century that predicted what teaching might be like in 2020. The children sat at the desks wearing headsets in virtual isolation from one another and where books were shoved into a mulcher that fed data into the kids via the headsets. In one sense this prediction of the use of IT was accurate, but in another not, because children nowadays are encouraged to be curious rather than being spoon fed info.

Roy amused us with this anecdote; 50% of what children learn comes from the child sitting next to them, but half of which is incorrect (I remember misspelling the word `*friend* as *freind* because the boy sitting next to me had written it that way). Despite this, collaborative learning is encouraged, and the challenge now is addressing change.

Roy showed us the top ten desired learning outcomes for the years 2015, 2020 and 2025. Some of these outcomes were the same, but #1 was always different. For 2025 the #1 outcome is Judgement and Decision Making.

Roy briefly touched on the old labels of IQ and EQ (emotional intelligence) but then added CI (cultural intelligence). Specialist Learning, STEM and the school's Rowing Program allows some children from outside of the HIHS zone to now attend the school.

Hey, this is all a far cry from what many of us remember of our secondary schooling experience and we wish Roy all the best for his tenure at NIHS.

ICE BREAKER



There was a wide range of responses, some recalling watching the test pattern for hours in awe of the new technology. Some recalled some of the great early western series like Rawhide and Bonanza. The recurring screenings of The Sound of Music also captured some who had watched it many times. Days Of Our Lives was mentioned as one of the longest running soapies and Playschool as probably the longest running Australian program. Sesame Street was also mentioned for its longevity, but it was thought that had been ended now (update: it looks like Netflix have bought the rights and new episodes will still be produced). Some great programs also mentioned included Star Trek, The Thunderbirds and Skippy. A dislike of commercials was also mentioned and there seemed to be agreement on that one.









QUIZ QUESTION

When did TV start in Australia & South Australia – year and date please!

A: Australian TV began on 16th September 1956 in Sydney. Interestingly, the Chifley government wanted to establish TV in 1948 adopting the UK BBC approach and passed laws to do so, but they then lost power, and the Menzies government made a meal of it deciding that it needed to be the US commercial model instead, which took much longer to establish.

Melbourne followed soon after on 4th November 1956 in time for the Olympic opening ceremony on 22nd November 1956.

Adelaide's first broadcast was on 5th September 1959.







The walk itself is quite a simple concept, however, there are many expenses that combined, add up to a considerable sum. There are unavoidable promotional costs; production of quality banners and signs; hire of pro-quality sound systems; Council permits; First Aid fees; Band fees; Seating + more

Moving forward, we want to have a Rotary Walk For Respect Day on the South Australian calendar annually and we can expect it to cost around \$25,000 p.a. to keep this going.

With the financial help of each dub - with an average annual donation of \$500 per club - we can secure the future of the Walk, plus the new initiatives we are launching. Should excess funds be collected, the Committee will initially hold funds in reserve to underwrite the future of the Walk. However, at a later stage, accumulated funds can be put towards other DV initiatives.


